I can't believe we are ready for the program year already. Things will get a whole lot busier. Hopefully it won't just feel busier but also meaningful. To help that happen your Adult Christian Education committee has planned some great classes. Here is the list of what is coming:

September 18—October 31

Once again we will offer a "Positive Discipline" parenting class for the parents among us.

September 18—October 2

Rita Lou Clarke will teach a class on "Women in the Gospel of Luke."

October 9-23

Boyd Stockdale will teach a class on Presbyterian polity. While that topic sounds like a rather serious and not so exciting subject, Boyd has taught this at Mercer Island Presbyterian Church to enthusiastic reviews. Certainly our polity (or how we govern ourselves) in the Presbyterian Church has raised all kinds of controversial issues in the past few years as we have changed our standards for ordination, etc.

October 30—November 20

We will study the book *Living Beyond War*. Given the devastation of all the wars around the globe, we need to figure out how to live beyond solving world tensions with violence. This class will be taught by Dave Gallotte, Dori Yang, Tony Copes and Rob McClure.

November 27—December 18

I will again teach a class looking at four short stories from the book *Faith Stories*. I will post which stories in another newsletter. Going through Advent, preparing for the incarnation of God in Jesus, makes a class on short stories very helpful. Certainly many of us who love to read have felt God's presence incarnated in works of fiction.

This is a very exciting time in the life of Treehouse as we focus on making a bold and important difference in the high school graduation rate of foster kids.

Did you know that:

- ◆ In King County only 30.9% of foster youth graduate high school on time as compared to 80% of their peers
- ◆ A recent study found that within 12 to 18 months after leaving foster care, 50% of youth were unemployed, 20% of the girls had given birth, more than 25% of the boys had been incarcerated and 33% were receiving public assistance
- ◆ Nearly half of foster youth in the United States become homeless when they turn 18
- ◆ Nearly 25% of foster care alumni suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder

We believe that education is the key to changing the trajectory of the lives of foster youth and changing these tragic outcomes. We believe that focusing on high school graduation for foster kids is the solution. This fall Treehouse is launching an ambitious campaign to double the high school graduation rate for foster youth in King County over the next five years. Treehouse’s programs which focus on enrichment, education and educational advocacy are strategically aligned to meet this goal.

We are always looking for volunteers to help us at Treehouse. Our next volunteer orientation is on September 15 at 6:00 p.m. Please email volunteer@treehouseforkids.org to reserve your spot.

I would also be thrilled if we could fill a table at Treehouse’s annual high tea fundraiser on November 6 and 13. Tickets are \$175—join my table and 100% of your ticket price goes to fund programs for foster kids. In addition to helping foster kids, you’ll have an amazing experience at the Norcliffe estate wearing a vintage hat of your choice (over 1,000 to choose from) while enjoying wonderful fellowship with your Newport friends. MAYORS' DAY OF CONCERN FOR THE HUNGRY FOOD DRIVE
