If you would particularly like your gift to go to Treehouse, please mark it as such.

Peacemaking Offering

The Mission Committee has chosen to send Newport Presbyterian's share of the Peacemaking Offering to the Nonviolent Peaceforce. If "war is not the answer" the Nonviolent Peaceforce is a working alternative. This international organization trains and sends unarmed, civilian peacemakers into conflict situations, communicating with combatants, keeping civilians safe and enabling civil societies to carry on their work and build lasting peace.

Compared to the cost of war, unarmed, professional civilian peacekeeping is inexpensive. Nonviolent Peaceforce could send 2,000 well-trained peacekeepers into a war zone for one year for the same amount of money the world's militaries spend every four minutes.

Patten's Perspective

A message from Pastor Jim Patten

As I write this article we are heading into the last two Sundays of the liturgical year on November 15 and 22nd. Advent starts on November 29th. There is something about endings and beginnings that touch my heart. I love the cyclical nature of the liturgical year. It starts with preparing for incarnation and ends with celebrating God's incarnation in Jesus as King (Christ the King Sunday).

God is incarnated, however imperfectly, in much of life. We sense God's presence in the ordinary if we have eyes to see that presence and hearts to feel it. One of the ways we tune our eyes and hearts to recognize God is in literature. The best literature incarnates truths that only stories can reveal. The Gospel story is the ultimate example of that, but fiction also is a rich source.

This Advent I will be teaching an adult class on Sunday mornings from the book *Faith Stories: Short Fiction on the Varieties and Vagaries of Faith*. This book is the follow up to the book *God Stories*, edited by C. Michael Curtis. These books are full of short stories that capture, sometimes in surprising ways, issues of faith and glimpses of God.

The class will begin the first Sunday of Advent, November 29th and go for four weeks through December 20. If you come to the class it would help if you buy the book and read the story for each Sunday. The book can be found on Amazon.com or at your local bookstore. Here is the schedule:

- November 29 we will read “My Son the Fanatic”- pp. 67-76
- December 6 we will read “The Third Generation”- pp. 169-188
- December 13 we will read “Full Day”- pp. 159-168
- December 20 we will read “The Comedian”- pp. 77-89

These stories cover many different faith traditions. They are powerful, peculiar, and sometimes very funny. I hope they become a unique way to prepare our hearts for incarnation this Advent.

Deacons Corner

Meet Fred Dunlap



Fred Dunlap is deacon for the Cherry Ministry Unit. This is the fourth time he has served as deacon. He is also a Stephen Minister and has served as an Elder. He coordinated the ushers for nine years and frequently is the friendly face to greet you on Sunday mornings.

Fred, his late wife Nancy and two high-school aged children Alison and Paul, joined Newport in 1981 after they moved to the area from Virginia. Both teenagers were active in the senior high group. Paul met his future wife, Michelle Ruckhaber on a Deputation trip. Paul and Michelle now live in Carlsbad, CA with their two sons and a daughter and belong to the La Costa Presbyterian Church. Alison and her husband and two sons belong to Cottage Grove Presbyterian in Oregon where Alison is a part-time church secretary. She is also a consulting wildlife biologist.

When he was a child, Fred occasionally attended church with friends. He was baptized at the base chapel at Wright Patterson AFB in Dayton, Ohio when Paul was four months old, along with Nancy and Alison.

Fred attended the UW and worked part-time at Boeing as a student engineer until he graduated with a degree in Electrical Engineering. He immediately entered the Air Force and was stationed at Scott AFB in Illinois as a communications officer. When Nancy graduated from college a year later, they married and eventually were assigned to Elmendorf AFB in Alaska where Alison was born. They lived in Pullman for a year and a half when Fred studied for his Masters in EE. After that, they transferred to Wright Patterson AFB where Paul was born. They also had posts in San Antonio, Wiesbaden Germany and finally northern Virginia when Fred worked for the Pentagon. After retiring from the Air Force, he returned to Boeing and worked on advanced weapon systems for 20 years.

Hiking is one of Fred's "sacred" activities. He has hiked for 11 years with the Newport men's hiking group and also pedals with the men's biking group. *"I didn't know the meaning of fellowship until I joined the men's biking group,"* Fred says, *"There is a special bond between the participants of this small church group open to all male members and much brotherly love."*

As an outdoorsman, he also is an avid fisherman who shares the salmon and trout he catches. Fred enjoys woodcarving and likes to create pieces with a Northwest Indian style.

Fred's community service in early adulthood focused on sporting activities: Little League before the children were born and then coaching girl's soccer in Virginia when Alison was in ninth grade and boy's basketball at the YMCA when Paul was in ninth grade. Today he is concerned with caring for the environment

As a deacon, Fred wants to be aware of any difficulties experienced by the families in his ministry unit and also to encourage them to know and care for one another.

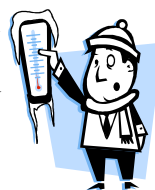
