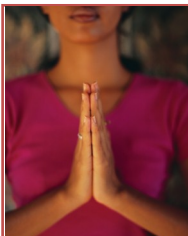

### **Prayer Concerns and Support Opportunities**

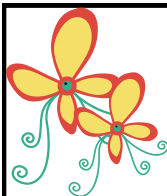

### **WARM FOR WINTER**

At some point during the recent school year 18,000 kindergarten through high school students in Washington state experienced homelessness. However, men comprise the largest population of the homeless followed by families, women and youth. **WARM for WINTER** is a 100% volunteer project of handmade scarves and hats for the homeless in the larger Seattle area. Since 2006 members of several different faith communities have provided thousands of these items for the homeless. Newport has had an active part most of that time and we’re doing it again this year. ### **Whoever Thought Halloween Could Come to This?**

The Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF (United Nations International Children’s Emergency Fund) started at Bridesburg Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia as a collection of old shoes for European refugees. Pastor Clyde and wife Mary Emma Allison encouraged their church children to channel their Halloween gatherings through church world service.

It did not take long for this idea to gain in popularity to swell beyond Presbyterian congregations. UNICEF leaders embraced the concept and monetary donations were added. By the mid-1960s more than three million children were taking part in the annual event.

For a couple of years I wondered if anything truly significant was happening at a world level locally. In 1969 our family visited mission work in Ethiopia. Plans included a visit to a remote leprosy clinic called Gendaberet, accessible only by small airplane. At the last moment, a radio message came indicating that the leprosy clinic was out of UNICEF leprosy medicine and food for leprosy children. The supplies were available at a UN office in Addis Ababa. Three of us flew to Gendaberet in a Missionary Aviation Fellowship Cessna 170 and I requested the privilege to unload the four boxes (two of each) and deliver by hand to the clinic.

I have not doubted the effectiveness of Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF since. 2010 marks the 60th anniversary of Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF. During that time the program has raised nearly \$160 million. Much of this report is included in the October 2010 issue of Presbyterian Today in the church library.
